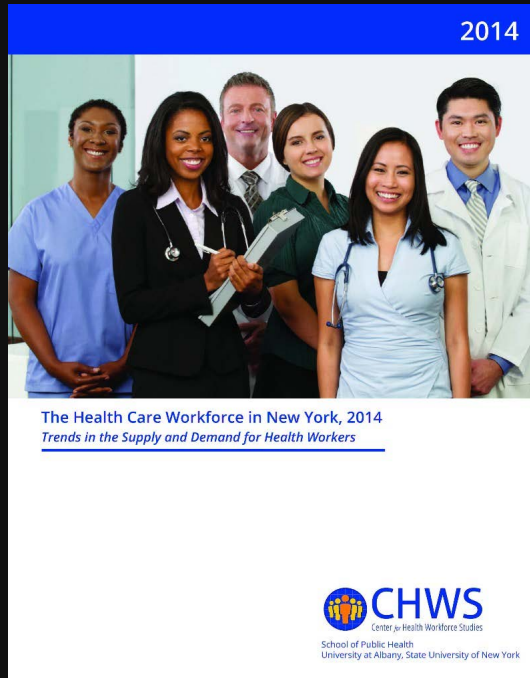




Tracking Report Gains Traction



The Health Care Workforce in New York, 2014: Trends in the Supply and Demand for Health Workers

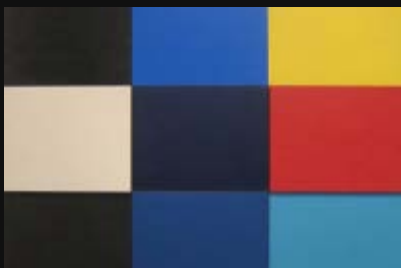
This annual report summarizes health care employment trends in New York using data about jobs by health care setting and professions to identify the health professions and occupations in greatest demand currently and to offer projections for future demand. This year's report found strong job growth in health care: between 2000 and 2013, health care sector employment rose nearly 20% while job growth in other employment sectors remained constant.

Case Studies of 8 Federally Qualified Health Centers: Strategies to Integrate Oral Health with Primary Care

The Oral Health Workforce Research Center (OHWRC) at CHWS completed a research project that included case studies of federally qualified health centers (FQHCs) across the United States. This report reveals how these health centers integrate primary care and oral health care services. It also describes their use of new or alternative oral health workforce models to better achieve the objectives of increased access and improved oral health outcomes for their patient populations.

Trends in Demand for New Physicians, 2010-2014: A Summary of Demand Indicators for 35 Physician Specialties

The job market for new physicians who complete their Graduate Medical Education in New York continues to be strong. This annual report provides a summary of demand indicators for 35 physician specialties. The analysis of these job market indicators revealed that opportunities for newly-trained physicians in most specialties have improved or remained stable over the last several years. Demand for newly-trained primary care physicians outweighs demand for specialists. In 2014, primary care physicians reported more job offers than specialists and were less likely to report changing plans due to limited job opportunities.

Works in Progress

State Health Workforce Data Collection Inventory

As the impacts of health reform are felt across the country, states are recognizing the importance of having timely, objective, and comprehensive data on their health workforce to inform decision-making. A growing number of states are developing or planning to develop health workforce monitoring systems to use for health workforce planning. In order to learn more about this, HWTAC is conducting a survey of states on their health workforce data collection and analysis efforts. Underrepresented Minority Dentist's Contribution to Health

Equity in the US

Black, Hispanic, and American Indian/Alaska Native dentists are vastly underrepresented relative to their proportion in the general population. To support HRSA's efforts to improve health workforce diversity, OHWRC will be examining nationally representative sample survey data of underrepresented minority (URM) dentists in the US to determine the supply, distribution, and practice patterns of URM dentists, current contributions to dental care for minority populations, and project future supply and impact on the access to care for minority populations based on cohort practice patterns and projected inflows through US schools as well as immigration flows over time. This study will provide the best evidence to date on the return on investment for these efforts.
